Boro-Linc in the Bronx

Boro-Linc kicked off last week at Hostos Center for the Arts & Culture in the Bronx. Viento de Agua, Puerto Rico's leading bomba and plena band, drew an audience of over 450—the program's largest to date! Community Artist-in-Residence Ivory Nunez Medrano noted: "The event was a space for Bronx residents to peacefully enjoy live music, share stories, and taste local food. We were surrounded by friends, neighbors, and family members of all ages. It was an uplifting experience."

<u>Boro-Linc's season at Hostos</u> continues to feature Latinx artists, and explore social and environmental justice, through April. It includes performances, art-making activities, and community resource fairs.



Big Umbrella Festival

The <u>Big Umbrella Festival</u> hit not one, but two milestones this past week! On Saturday, the festival began with a day of celebration at the Atrium, featuring a relaxed performance by Brady Rymer and the Little Band that Could, and one by Actionplay Chorus. Audience members and artists opened brightly-colored parasols in unison to ceremoniously mark the start of this groundbreaking festival for kids with autism and their families.

On Thursday, a daylong symposium on "The Intersection of the Arts and Autism" drew artists, educators, and others to the Kaplan Penthouse for a day of sharing and learning. Highlights included expert panels on the creation of theater *for* audiences on the autism spectrum, the creation of theater *with* people on the spectrum, and the ways in which the arts and autism interact. That night, Lincoln Center's Facebook Livestream of the event had already surpassed 4,000 views! The Big Umbrella Festival runs through May 9 with performances at LCE, LC Kids Storytime at the Atrium, and workshops at constituent organizations across campus.



LC Kids Visit Broadway!

Families shared an unforgettable afternoon experiencing the magic of theater together on April 15 when LC Kids had their performance outing to see *Frozen* on Broadway! Over 200 members participated in the event, which featured a post-performance talkback with cast members—hosted exclusively for LC Kids.
