'Dancing Through the Bronx'

Dancing in the Streets has devoted 30 years to producing free dance performances in unexpected, outdoor spaces. Since 1984, it's accomplished over 500 such shows. This month, you can catch three site-specific pieces in the parks of the Bronx. On Aug. 13, the dancers will appear at Wave Hill. On Aug. 14 it will be Hayden Lord Park. Birds of all feathers flock to Burlesque Fest

All ages and races are represented in performances, parties, panels and more.



While much of the theater and dance world are dominated by lithe white artists in their prime, burlesque has always been a haven for all ages, body types and backgrounds. That's never been more apparent than at the 14th annual New York Burlesque Festival.

One way the Burlesque Festival commits to inclusivity is by opening its application process to anyone.

"Over 400 people apply each year, and we spend a lot of time curating a show that is going to be fun for

us and festivalgoers," says Jen Gapay, co-founder of Burlesque Fest (along with dancer Angie Pontani) and head of Thirsty Girl Productions. "Because we're in New York and have a great reputation, we attract a high caliber of performers. Audiences are really seeing the best burlesque performers in the world."

They include Poison Ivory, the winner of Miss Exotic World 2016 and the cover girl of this year's festival. She performs during the Saturday Showcase at B.B. King Blues Club & Grill, which is hosted by cabaret mainstay Murray

In addition to the performances, shopping bazaar and awards show (where the towering figure of shimmery spandex that is Scotty the Blue Bunny crowns the best

also parties on Thursday and Friday packed with unique burlesque acts. "Trends tend to be influenced by what's happening culturally in entertainment or politics," says Gapay. "This year we had a lot of people apply with bird acts for some reason. I'm not sure why, but this year people want to dress up like birds!"

Because the general population is becoming more appreciative of burlesque, the fest continues to thrive. "Pretty much everyone who has been to a show embraces the sexuality, sensuality and comedy," Gapay says. For newcomers, she suggests: "Just come with an open mind and heart, and know that burlesque welcomes and supports people of all bodies types. And be ready to have a great time!"



This production has had a bit of a staggered start. Technically, it's been playing since New Year's Eve. But although it was originally scheduled to run six weeks, it just officially opened last Saturday and the current extension goes through "late spring." In that time, you'd think there would be a much bigger fuss from marketing and word-of-mouth; after all, this show is from the team behind theater cult



classic "Sleep No More."

Instead, it's still kind of underground. In fact, it's literally underground at a club formerly known as Diamond Horseshoe, which sits below the Paramount Hotel. The renovated basement ballroom exudes secrecy, which is half the fun, so we won't spoil too much.

Loosely based on Mozart's "Magic Flute," the story follows a sheltered princess who disobeys her mother and is separated from her forbidden lover. It's also an immersive theater piece. Anything can happen to you: You might get drawn into a secret chamber to give the princess, Pamina, a bath; you might have your fortune read; you could even be summoned by the intimi-dating and mysterious Queen Marchesa. Prepare to be touched and otherwise sensually challenged (although you're free to decline, of course).

'Queen of the Night'

For the first of three hours, you enjoy a welcome cocktail and small bites while (hopefully) engaging in your own private scenes. Then everyone sits at communal tables, where snacks and wine await, and the show begins. Professional dancers and French-Canadian troupe Les 7 Doigts de la Main play the parts of royals, their attendants and bodyguards. The acrobatic acts take on a narrative, which elevates many of the same tricks

you may have seen in 7 Fingers' "Traces" (2011) or even Broadway's "Pippin" (on which they also collaborated). Some may find the storyline muddled (it's not primarily a play), but it's all still visually stunning.

The plot resolves, but it's more negligible than ever when the room suddenly turns into a dance party and everyone starts swaying with strangers and sharing cake. It's not the orgy you might infer with all of the sexual buildup, sadly, and shortly you may begin to eye your comrades-in-arms in a new light. There's a long way to go back up to the street, and that coat check line is going to be a bitch. So in the end, "Queen of the Night" doesn't quite transcend reality — not like "Sleep No More" — but it's a hell of a great night out.



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Double threat



A look into the mind of KILLERS

▶ Manhattan's famed haunted house is getting even scarier ▶ This year, performers take on Jeffrey Dahmer, John Wayne Gacy and other real-life monsters ▶ A rundown of the city's other haunted house real estate



For a city with famously expensive — and scarce — real estate, there sure are a lot of haunted houses that spring up across the boroughs this time of year. One of the most intriguing and popular pop-ups of the season is KILLERS: A Nightmare Haunted House, which is hosted by the Clemente Soto Velez Cultural & Educational Center on the Lower Fast Side. Instead of focusing on the usual (and fake) spooky suspects, this year KILLERS focuses on real-life serial killers like Ted Bundy and Jack the Ripper. We spoke to codirector John Harlacher for a

behind-the-scenes look at how this Nightmare came about:

How long does it take to set up each night?

Four hours before each show, we begin by testing each trick and effect. The makeup and costume crew arrives two hours before showtime, and actors come in up to 90 minutes before, depending on how complex their effects are. **How big is the cast?**

We have a cast of 50, but 35 are performing each night. Many parts are too physically demanding to do every night,

so we have a rotating cast. What's the approximate cost to put it all together?

We are the only haunted house on Earth that does a completely different show each year, so we spend a lot. It's not the smartest model, but it would be boring for us otherwise. Most people build their haunt once and tweak it enough to trick people into coming back. We spend over a half million dollars creating our show.



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Cathartic comedy

Humor gets darker, weirder and way more real this fall.



It's a stressful time in our nation right now, and we could all use a good laugh. Thankfully, New York City stages are packed with amazing comedy shows this season, ranging from scathing observational humor by former "Daily Show" correspondent Lewis Black to big, fat belly laughs with selfdescribed Queen of Mean Lisa Lampanelli.

"Black to the Future"

Lewis Black returns to Broadway with his new full-length standup show, "Black to the Future." The sardonic comedian takes on the election cycle, its political talking heads and the crazy country they're competing to lead. As if that weren't enough, Black has also hinted he's likely to update the script with any juicy tidbits that occur between each performance, which will be especially enticing when the debates begin. "Career Suicide"

Following its sold-out run at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival, Chris Gethard's "Career Suicide" makes its way to NYC. Presented by Judd Apatow, the show explores unfunny topics like depression, alcoholism and suicide, but with shocking candor and unapologetic jest. Gethard's work has been defined by his almost exhibitionistic

levels of vulnerability, because when he's making fun of himself, you're free to join. Don't feel bad for making fun of mental illness you're just helping to destigmatize it through comedy.
