



# Lincoln Center Patron Picks



Summertime at Lincoln Center is filled with so many performing arts festivals, they actually outnumber the months! In June, July, and August, four beloved series dedicated to music, dance, theater, and more return to our inviting plazas and prestigious halls—and that's not even counting our ongoing campus programming, like the free events taking place weekly at the David Rubenstein Atrium. With the sun shining down on our scenic campus, things really do start to heat up onstage; so, to help you make the most of your summer, we've rounded up a few of the seasonal highlights coming to Lincoln Center.

### Midsummer Night Swing (June 27–July 15)

Lincoln Center's social dance party under the stars returns this month with three weeks of performances in Damrosch Park. An incredible roster of local talent is rounded out with artists from around the globe who bring diverse musical genres and the dance styles that complement them. Highlights include an opening night concert with the Legendary Count Basie Orchestra (June 27), an appearance by Cuba's Issac Delgado Orchestra (July 5), and the return of the Loser's Lounge (June 29)—plus a spectacular evening with David Ostwald's Louis Armstrong Eternity Band (July 4). Don't worry if you don't know the moves; evenings begin with a short dance lesson! The season closes on a high note with the always-popular Harlem Renaissance Orchestra (July 15), which sells out fast—so be sure to grab tickets soon.

# Lincoln Center Festival (July 10–30)

Since 1967, Lincoln Center Festival has been presenting performing arts from outside the Western canon, as well as pieces that deepen our relationship with more traditional works. This year's lineup is dedicated to the theme of crossing borders, both figuratively and literally. It includes three theatrical pieces that create a timely and touching dialogue about the Middle East: Amos Gitai's Yitzhak Rabin: Chronicle of an Assassination (featuring videography, music, and recitation, July 19); Hanan Snir's To the End of the Land (an Israeli family drama based on David Grossman's bestselling novel, July 24-27); and Mohammad Al Attar's While I Was Waiting (which uses real interviews to inform a fictional tale about modern life in Syria, July 19-22). What will undoubtedly be the great treasure of this season is George Balanchine's Jewels, celebrating its 50th anniversary with an international tribute featuring the Bolshoi Ballet, New York City Ballet, and Paris Opera Ballet sharing the stage in a historic presentation of this masterwork (July 20-23). The Bolshoi will also present Shakespeare's *The Taming of the Shrew*, with choreography by Jean-Christophe Maillot (July 26-30).

# Mostly Mozart Festival (July 25-August 20)

Mostly Mozart this summer highlights the profound impact left by the short life of Franz Schubert, presenting his "Great" Symphony (August 4–5) and The Dark Mirror: Zender's Winterreise (August 12–13), an enthralling theatrical production by Netia Jones, starring tenor lan Bostridge, with orchestrations by Hans Zender. Renée and Robert Belfer Music Director Louis Langrée returns to the podium for his 15th season, beginning with The Singing *Heart* (July 25–26), an exuberant evening of symphony and song performed by the Mostly Mozart Festival Orchestra. Guest artists throughout the festival include Jeremy Denk (July 28-29), Joshua Bell, and Steven Isserlis (August 8–9); ensembles include Les Arts Florissants (July 27), the Danish String Quartet (August 10), and So Percussion with the New York premiere of David Lang's man made (August 1-2). It concludes with the return of the Budapest Festival Orchestra's provocative staged concert of Don Giovanni (August 17, 19, 20), conducted and directed by Iván Fischer.

# Lincoln Center Out of Doors (July 26-August 13)

If you really needed another excuse to visit our 16-acre campus on a beautiful summer day, there's nothing more enticing than three weeks of entirely free concerts during Lincoln Center Out of Doors. This year's most anticipated moments include our opening-day with *NPR Music's Turning the Tables Live*, paying respect to the women who paved the way for today's record-shattering female artists. **Miguel Atwood-Ferguson's** *Suite for Ma Dukes* draws on hip-hop producer J Dilla as an inspiration (August 4), complemented by **Momma's Hip Hop Kitchen** on July 30. Another feature is the long-awaited return of the **National Double Dutch Competition**, which took place over 30 years ago on the Josie Robertson Plaza. This summer, two days are dedicated to the movement-based art form, including a symposium and the screening of *Pick Up Your Feet: The Double Dutch Show*, during Family Weekend (July 29–30).
